
Overview of land governance in Malawi

Malawi has a land policy

- Goal- to ensure tenure security and equitable access to land
- Land is either categorized as public or private land

▲ Ten land and land-related laws were passed in 2016

- Customary land act of 2016
 - Allows creation of customary estates in Traditional Land Management Areas
 - Allows rural households to get legal title to their land
- Registered Amendment Act of 2016
 - Provides legal registration of customary estates





Introduction 2/3

- Land transactions in Malawi occur on customary tenure systems
 - >70% of the land is under customary land
 - 24% of women solely own land for cultivation
- Rural households participate in land markets: buying, selling, renting land or "Pinyolo"
- Why are rural households involved in land markets?
 - An economy advances (income)
 - Improve equity
 - Resource constraints



Introduction 3/3

- Despite women's involvement in land markets, disparities still exist in their level of participation as compared to men
 - The imperfections in rental markets are more likely to disproportionally affect female landowners since they normally have weaker property rights
- Understanding the gender differences in land markets is crucial for formulating informed and effective policies

Objectives

- To investigate the differences between male and female-headed households regarding land rental market participation
- To understand the factors that influence land rental market participation and what contributes to the gender gap in market participation




Data Sources & Methods

- Utilize panel data from the Integrated Household Panel Survey (IHPS)
 - Survey waves (2016 & 2019)
 - A balanced panel of 1,177 households
- Decomposition the gender disparities in market participation
 - Investigate the sources of the disparities between female and male-headed households

Results- Gender disparities land rental markets

How big is the gap?

	2016	2019
Male	0.160	0.120
Female	0.046	0.039
Diff	0.115	0.080

What influences the gender disparities land rental market participation?

Gains in education or literacy levels of female headed households

Conclusion and key messages

- Land rental market participation in Malawi is decreasing
- High-level land rental market participation is still higher among the male-headed households
- The gender disparities still remain but the gap between the gender group has reduced
- Women empowerment through education is key in increasing women participation in land rental markets
